Bargo Energy wins suit

A judge entered a judgment against Reunion Industries Inc. that could be worth more than \$8 million to Bargo Energy Co.

A jury in April found that Reunion had misrepresented the value of its oil and gas assets during negotiations to sell those assets to Bargo.

Bargo, which had put up \$500,000 in escrow, then decided to pull out and Reunion sued. Bargo then filed a countersuit alleging fraud.

The jury awarded Bargo \$5 million in exemplary damages.

This week, state District Judge Russell Lloyd ordered that the \$500,000 in escrow be returned to Bargo, plus interest, and awarded Bargo \$2 million in attorney fees.

Should Reunion appeal the judgment and lose, it would be liable for up to \$897,500 in additional attorney fees, depending on how far the appeal is taken, the judge ruled.

An attorney for Reunion could not be reached.

Plaintiff sought \$3,600,000 in actual damages plus punitive damages for interference with a business relation and attorneys' fees and costs.
